Clr McKenzie has been given a heads up that the Mapua Community Assn have some questions about the fast track announcement earlier in the week, and has some questions (below). Kim has provided some context below and I have some additional info (in blue)).

A media release and newsline article are also being developed. It to touches on these three points.

- 1 What involvement did the TDC have in the inclusion of the proposal in the Fast track Bill? None. The developer made staff aware they were considering it but we did not include it in the mayor's letter or offer a letter of support as we thought it would prejudice the masterplan process.
- 2. Given its on the list, what does this mean for zoning and consent processes for this area? Too early to say lots of uncertainty at this point and the bill has yet to pass and may be changed. The bill contemplates the EPA managing the process and its not clear what input council or the community will get or if they do, on what matters (e.g. only infrastructure or wider matters) . I suspect very little impact on zoning changes at this stage as that is intended to kick off next year and the consent may not start to be proceeded until after that. In any case, we'll need zoning changes to reflect the intended residential nature of the land in the future (currently rural res).
- 3. What does it mean for the Mapua Master plan? Very little in my view at this stage. The early engagement material we discussed with the community and draft we discussed the other day (and intend to bring to council in 2 weeks) are well aligned with the application. What this does do is take most focus away from whether or not it should happen to what influence the community and council would like and get that represented in the final masterplan. This means we can use this document as a guide to council input into the consent process.

I am attaching the two submissions that we made on the Fast Track proposal/Bill. Neither of them refer to Seaton Valley proposal but both seek support for our FDS. I don't believe there was any additional staff input into that legislation – but copying in Dwayne in case he is aware of something that I am not.

I would also suggest that we need to wait for the Select Committee report back on the Bill (due October 18th) before we can assess the impacts of the Bill when it is passed. There were a large number of submitters to the Bill and the Government have already announced that they have recommended changes to the Select Committee. So its final shape is still up in the air to some degree – although it is clear that the Government intend to pass the Bill into law this year. Again, Dwayne may be able to add some perspective on the implications for the Māpua masterplan, but I don't think it would be wise to speculate at this stage.

This all suggests to me that the timing of the Assn meeting is such that there is very little the Council can say with certainty beyond the two Government announcements they have

made on the Bill.
